Trinity Sunday

Since Advent Sunday, we have been reflecting, Sunday -by-Sunday upon a "biographical" telling of the life of Jesus, from its anticipation and his birth at Advent and Christmas, to his Passion, Resurrection and Ascension in recent weeks. In this Trinity season, or "Ordinary Time", we will reflect each week upon the rich treasury of gospel passages and epistles reflecting upon the life and teachings of Jesus, and the doctrines, such as the Trinity, that have emerged from this...

This season is marked with some significant feasts, but no great festal or pennitenial cycles. On 24 June, the longest day, the Birth of John the Baptist is celebrated, exactly six months before, and at the opposite point of the solar cycle to, the birth of Jesus. Poetically, John, born when the sun is at its strongest, must decrease, in order that Jesus, born in darkness, may increase..

In the northern hemisphere at least, Ordinary Time marks the season of harvest, of gathering and storing food for the coming winter, ensuring a supply of daily bread for the year ahead.

Gathering

The president says

Introduction

We are truly sorry and repent of all our sins.

For the sake of your Son Jesus Christ, who died for us, forgive us all that is past and grant that we may serve you in newness of life to the glory of your name.

Amen.

Almighty God, who forgives all who truly repent, have mercy upon you, pardon and deliver you from all your sins, confirm and strengthen you in all goodness, and keep you in life eternal; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen**

Gloria

Glory to God in the highest. and peace to his people on earth. Lord God, heavenly King. almighty God and Father. we worship you, we give you thanks, we praise you for your glory. Lord Jesus Christ, only Son of the Father. Lord God, Lamb of God, you take away the sin of the world: have mercy on us: you are seated at the right hand of the Father: receive our prayer. For you alone are the Holy One. you alone are the Lord. you alone are the Most High, Jesus Christ, with the Holy Spirit. in the glory of God the Father. Amen.

The Nicene Creed

maker of heaven and earth. of all that is, seen and unseen. We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God. eternally begotten of the Father. Prayer over the gifts

The president says

Holy God, holy and strong, holy and immortal, give us the bread of everlasting life, and make us branches of the true vine. Amen.

Eucharistic Prayer

The president says

The Lord be with you and also with you.

Lift up your hearts.

We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give thanks and praise.

It is indeed right, our duty and our joy, always and everywhere to give you thanks. holy Father, almighty and eternal God. For with your only-begotten Son and the Holy Spirit you are one God, one Lord. All that you reveal of your glory. the same we believe of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, without any difference or inequality. We, your holy Church, acclaim you, Father of majesty unbounded, your true and only Son, worthy of all worship. and the Holy Spirit, advocate and guide. Three Persons we adore. one in being and equal in majesty. And so with angels and archangels, with cherubim and seraphim. we sing for ever of your glory:

Holy, holy, holy Lord, God of power and might, heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest. Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest. Lord, you are holy indeed, the source of all holiness; grant that by the power of your Holy Spirit, and according to your holy will, these gifts of bread and wine may be to us the body and blood of our Lord Jesus Christ;

who, in the same night that he was betrayed, took bread and gave you thanks; he broke it and gave it to his disciples, saying: Take, eat; this is my body which is given for you; do this in remembrance of me.

In the same way, after supper he took the cup and gave you thanks; he gave it to them, saying:

Drink this, all of you; this is my blood of the new covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.

Great is the mystery of faith: Christ has died: Christ is risen: Christ will come again.

And so, Father, calling to mind his death on the cross, his perfect sacrifice made once for the sins of the whole world; rejoicing in his mighty resurrection and glorious ascension, and looking for his coming in glory, we celebrate this memorial of our redemption. As we offer you this our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving, we bring before you this bread and this cup and we thank you for counting us worthy to stand in your presence and serve you.

Send the Holy Spirit on your people and gather into one in your kingdom all who share this one bread and one cup, so that we, in the company of Blessed Mary, Mother of our Lord, St Peter and all the saints, may praise and glorify you for ever, through Jesus Christ our Lord; by whom, and with whom, and in whom, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory be yours, almighty Father, for ever and ever. **Amen.**

The Lord's Prayer

Organ Voluntary

Fugue in E flat "St Anne" BWV 552, J S Bach (1685-1750)

Played and Recorded by Timothy Noon, Director of Music.

This five-voice fugue, named after the popular English hymn tune (known as the accompaniment to "O God, our help in ages past"), is rich in three-fold structures, and so is often associated with the Trinity. Hence its suitability for this Trinity Sunday. In E flat (key signature, three flats), it has three, interrelated subjects, dividing the piece into three equal parts. The first, opening theme, most readily reminds us of the hymn and is said, in its stately gravity, to represent God the Father. The second, lighter in touch, without using the large pedal pipes, is said to represent God the Son. The third, much more flighty and rapid, is said to represent God the Holy Spirit. Each subject is distinct, but interrelated. The first theme reappears at the end in the pedals: God the Father underpinning and closing the whole. It may be that the use of five voices refers to the Pentateuch, the first five books of the Bible, thereby relating the Doctrine of the Trinity to God's revealing the Law to Moses.
