Living in Love and Faith: two books are available in the Cathedral Shop; the course (£4.99) and the full book (£19.99).

Exhibition, 'Density and Lightness', comes to the Cathedral from 12 June to 30 August. It is the result of a collaboration between South West Sculptors and Exeter Cathedral. It features 75 sculptures from 24 artists, all working in the South West. The exhibit includes pieces made from stone, wood, ceramic, bronze, plaster and glass. The installations have been carefully curated and juxtapositioned to highlight links between the guest sculptures and the Cathedral's own permanent works. Throughout the exhibition, we will be welcoming the exhibitors to the Cathedral to answer questions about the sculptures.
