From the Canon Chancellor: "What three words?"

I've recently returned from a holiday in Tewkesbury: An opportunity to experience the music festival, spend quality time with family and friends, interspersed with walking the Malverns, cycling in the Forest of Dean and visiting places of interest that had aroused our curiosity.

Although the weather was variable, for that read wet, wild and windy, on one day it worked to our advantage as we were able to snap up the last two tickets for a Garden Tour of Highgrove; the result of a cancellation because of inclement weather.

If you've never been on a Garden Tour of Highgrove, I highly recommend it, although we quickly discovered that using the Satnav alone did not take us to the destination unless supplemented by the specific instructions outlined on the website.

My husband, who was navigating, is not known for his attention to detail. Why this should surprise me after twenty-five years of marriage, I do not know. Suffice it to say that we made the start of the tour by a whisker.

Reflecting on the experience afterwards, I regretted not using the What3Words App. Whilst three words did come to mind of what to say to my husband, not least: "Read the instructions!" the what3words app is an easy way to identify precise locations. Every 10 foot square has been given a unique combination of three words: a what3words address.

The what3words address for Exeter Cathedral is: cloth.kings.title. The app set me thinking. If you had to describe Exeter Cathedral in only three words, what three words would you use?

It's quite a challenge isn't it? How do you describe a place that is steeped in history and tradition but is also very much alive. How do you describe a place



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that is part building, part people, part complete? How do you describe a place that is both a tourist attraction, an events` venue, a place of community engagement and outreach but also, more importantly, a place of worship.

At a recent away day, Chapter reflected on this but although we came close to finding a strap line, it proved elusive. Like our image of God, it could not be pinned down because Church is a movement not a monument; though we did agree that the Cathedral should be built on faith, hope and love.

In September, in addition to welcoming new Chapter members, we also welcome ten new choristers: Elio, Seth, Elliot, Kokuua, Maria, Georgia, Minnie, Freya, Florence, Eloise; three new choral scholars: Benjamin Irvine-Capel, Jason Cobb, Adam Warne; a new organ scholar: Giles Longstaff; a new lay vicar: Alice Risdon-Osborne and a new Assistant Director of Music: Michael Stephens-Jones.

We hope that they will flourish here. Certainly, it's an exciting time to be joining Exeter Cathedral, and as specialist stonemasons build the Cloister Gallery one stone at a time it's a good opportunity for us to reflect on what it means to be living stones. We "like living stones, are being built into a spiritual house." (1 Peter2:5)

What are the foundation stones in your life? What three words would you use to describe yourself? What three words would other people use to describe you? Is it how you would want to be described?

Do take full advantage of the different opportunities the Cathedral offers to deepen and grow your faith and spiritual life through prayer, study groups and service. In September we begin a new lecture series called "In conversation with...?"; a new course, "Being with," which explores Christian Faith and Life by Samuel Wells and Sally Hitchener and we will be offering a monthly evening healing service.

How might we build our lives on faith, hope and love?

A New Exhibition

A new photographic exhibition of life on Dartmoor over the past 50 years will be on display in the Retrochoir at the Cathedral from 12th September to 1st October. The exhibition is the work of the Dartmoor photographer Chris Chapman, who began photographing life on the moor in 1972. Over the last half century he has created a unique portfolio of images celebrating people's dayto-day lives in the rural farming communities that give Dartmoor its special character.

The photographs have been kindly loaned by Providence Methodist Chapel, which is located in the north Dartmoor parish of Throwleigh. Providence is one of thirteen historic places of worship that lie along the Archangel Way, the recently established pilgrimage route that runs between the churches of St Michael the Archangel, Chagford, and St Michael de Rupe, Brentor. A celebration to mark the second anniversary of this new Way will take place at Belstone on Saturday 30 September.

Our speaker next month is: Ken Miles. а clinical academic who is fullv trained in two medical specialties: radiology and nuclear medicine. Bv bringing together these fields, he pioneered a novel method for imaging the flow of blood in tissues and organs. The technique. known as perfusion CT, is now used widely for the

assessment of patients suffering stroke.

More recently, his attention has turned to the interface between science and religion. Having previously published specialist textbooks in medical imaging, his latest book *From Billiard Balls to Bishops: A scientist's introduction to Christian worship* is written for a general readership and highlights his belief that scientific knowledge can provide resources for a life of faith and should not be a barrier to proclamation or belief. Visio Divina: Praying with the eyes of your heart

At the Greenbelt Festival this August Bank Holiday, one of the wonderful talks and workshops I attended was an introduction to *Visio Divina*. If *Lectio Divina* is a slow reading and absorbing of Scripture, *Visio Divina* is a slow reading of a picture, and it may be more helpful to those who find it easier to engage visually with the world rather than through words.

The leader Steve Radley led us through the following exercise (adapted):

- Find a picture or open a photo on your smartphone. Just the first one that comes to hand rather than spending time looking for a favourite. Thank God for the gift of this image.
- Spend some time stilling your mind. Close your eyes, and open your heart and mind to God. Ask God to speak so that you may hear. You may find it helpful to focus your attention for a time on your body and breath.
- Open your eyes and with a gentle gaze allow them to travel slowly around the picture, taking in all its shapes, colours and textures. Move from the top, across from left to right, working down as if you are reading a book.
- As you allow your eyes to wander, notice if there is a particular area that draws your eye, that stirs energy within you. Let your gaze rest here.
- Open your imagination to other images and memories which arise within you. Allow these places and colours to make connections, and notice any feelings they evoke. Reflect for a time on these feelings and memories. Are there places in your life where you are being called to bring more colour, more mystery, or more love?
- Now move to praying your response. Express to God very simply the impression the image and its associations have made on you. You may want to pray spontaneously, and thank God for the gift they bring, ask God questions, or express longings they have stirred.
- Or you may want to remain in loving silence, resting in God's presence in the image. If you find yourself becoming distracted, return to the image.

• As you end your time of prayer, allow your focus to fall back into the room. Thank God for the gift of the image and what it has evoked. If you are in a group, you may like to recite the Grace together.

A Thank You from the Vacancy in See Committee

A big THANK YOU from the Vacancy in See Committee (ViSC) for all your prayers as we continue our work. We have been preparing a Statement of Needs for the Diocese and working to a pretty tight deadline. The Statement is like a Parish Profile but writ large, and aims to paint an accurate picture of the Diocese with the challenges and opportunities it faces.

The Committee is made up of 30 people, clergy and lay, nominated, elected or there by virtue of the office they hold, e.g. The Dean of the Cathedral, the two Suffragan Bishops and the General Synod Representatives. The Chair is elected by the Bishop's Diocesan Council. Over the past few weeks we have consulted widely and held three Listening Exercises in Schools in Okehampton, Plymouth and Barnstaple for pupils, parents, teachers and School Governance Leaders. We were delighted with the response to our on line questionnaire - thank you to the over 500 people who participated!

Next we look forward to the visit to the Diocese on 6/7th September of Stephen Knott, the Archbishops' Secretary for Appointments and Jonathan Hellewell, the Prime Minister's Appointments Secretary. Stephen and Jonathan will be consulting key people from all aspects of the commercial, religious, cultural and educational life of the Diocese. They will also visit a range of projects and Mission Communities around the Diocese. The 7th September is also the date for our next full meeting of the ViSC when we shall elect our six Diocesan Representatives to serve on the Crown Nominations Commission (CNC). It is the CNC who have the task of continuing the discernment process by drawing up the person specification and nominating the next Bishop of Exeter. They meet to fulfil this responsibility on 29th February and 9th and 10th April 2024, with the name of the new bishop being announced around June 2024

On the evening of 19th September there will be an on line Public meeting with an open invitation for anyone who would like to expressed a view on the needs of the Diocese. This is your chance to assist in shaping the next stage of making new disciples, growing in prayer and serving the people of Devon with joy. If you would like to attend to need to register here

Inaugural Posbury St. Francis Annual Lecture Monday 9th October in the evening

University of Exeter, Streatham Campus (Peter Chalk Building, Newman Red Lecture Theatre).

A Spoke in the Wheel of Injustice:

The Violence of Poverty and the Calling of the Church in an Age of Austerity Speaker: Dr. Chris Shannahan

The 'Age of Austerity' has ruptured the social fabric of contemporary Britain. Over the last decade, as austerity policies have damaged more and more individuals, families and communities, the Church has become an increasingly key player in the struggle to defeat contemporary poverty because of its deep roots in local neighbourhoods. In this lecture, Dr Chris Shannahan will draw on interviews and case studies from his recent 'Life on the Breadline' project to explore the violence of multidimensional poverty and the responses of Churches and Christian-NGOs across the UK. The lecture will reflect on the implications of the Church's commitment to 'transforming structural injustice' for Christian social action and argue that only a rooting of the foundational themes of liberation theology in breadline Britain can provide the tools needed to embody God's Preferential Option for the Poor in 2023. The Church stands at a *Kairos* moment – Are we ready to ram a "spoke into the wheel of injustice"?

Chris Shannahan is an Associate Professor in Political Theology at the Centre for Trust, Peace and Social Relations at Coventry University, where he is also the theme lead for research and teaching on Faith and Peaceful Relations. Before joining the Centre for Trust, Peace and Social Relations he was a lecturer in the Theology and Religion department at the University of Manchester and a Postdoctoral Researcher at the University of Birmingham. His research, which is informed by many years as an inner city Church minister and community organiser, focuses on the intersection between theology, poverty, racism, inequality and Christian social action as seen in his 2018-2021 'Life on the Breadline: Christianity, Poverty and Politics in the 21st century' project. Chris has researched and written widely on these topics as seen, for example in his two books – <u>Voices from the Borderland</u> (2010) and <u>A Theology of Community Organizing</u> (2014). He is currently working on his third monograph – Life on the Breadline: Towards a Theology of Liberation for an Age of Austerity.

This Lecture has been initiated and supported by the Posbury St. Francis Trust, in cooperation with the Exeter Centre for Practical Theology (EXCEPT) at the University of Exeter.

From The Company of Tapisers

I have been given a copy of a recently published book: 'Kneelers: The Unsung Folk Art of England and Wales' by Elizabeth Bingham. The author has spent over thirty years collecting images of kneelers made for churches and cathedrals throughout the country. She has reached the conclusion that kneelers have, unwittingly, formed a social record of the interests of those who made them.

She has photographs covering an eclectic range of themes: from dragons, angels, farm animals, cricket, flora and fauna and Biblical stories to local events and achievements. The book contains a 'rainbow' of kneelers, the majority of which were stitched during the reign of Queen Elizabeth II.

This book both celebrates the variety and complexity of designs, but also mourns the fact that kneelers are becoming redundant – and are slowly being withdrawn from use. The main problems are, first, it is no longer the practice to kneel for prayer during services and secondly, so many pews (with plenty of room to accommodate kneelers) have been replaced with stackable chairs. She feels this is a great loss and wants to play her part in preserving, what she sees as a unique art form. She has a collection of over 6,000 photographs which she intends to pass to a national institution to keep for posterity.

I contacted the author and, through the wonders of email, sent her some images of the kneelers at Exeter Cathedral. She was delighted to include them in her archive. While we still enjoy the use of many of our kneelers (especially in the side chapels), I am also delighted that some of the work of the Company of Tapisers will be kept on permanent record.


Elections 2023

The 2020s Development Appeal Project Update

Capital Works

the Following archaeological excavations, the contractors in the Quire have started to build up the lavers of the new breathable floor. First, the excavated area will be lined with a membrane that is designed to strengthen the surface and allow the flow of water. Then, the membrane will be covered with a layer called Glapor. this is gravel made from 100% recycled glass that will help manage the levels of moisture in the floor and prevent heat loss from the underfloor heating. On top of this, a strengthening grid

and mesh reinforcement will be installed on a second layer of membrane, ready for the installation of the floor heating system. Finally, a slab of limecrete will be poured. Limecrete is a sustainable alternative to concrete that is breathable, lightweight, and has insulating properties that will make the new underfloor heating more efficient.

In the Cloister Garden, another tier of scaffolding has been installed as specialist stonemasons continue to form the new Cloister walls. The scaffolding makes progress difficult to see, but, underneath it all, the stonemasons are working on course eleven of the interior and exterior walls and the tracery for the windows is also taking shape. The Cloister walls will be at column height by mid-September when the Cloister roof arrives.

Activity Plan

A second Riddler, Aly Stoneman, has started their residency at Exeter Cathedral. She will initially be working with people experiencing homelessness, encouraging them to tell their stories in a creative way, through group poems, storytelling, songs, collage and folded books. This project is a collaboration with St Petrock's centre, and we hope it will give a poetic voice to those who often don't get their stories heard.

Later in the summer and early autumn, Aly will be running creative writing sessions for the public, encouraging people to write their own poetry in response to the many green spaces, both large and small, that we have within the city. The poetry map will be filled with poems and stories specific to the location and will be shared later in the year.

In August, visitors had the opportunity to go behind the scenes with the Cathedral Architect to learn more about the ongoing works within the Cloister, Pearson building, and Quire and how we work to conserve the building for future generations. The next talks will be held on 11th October.

On Thursday 14th September we are holding a mini youth panel for 16–25-yearolds. Our aim for this project is to engage young people with their heritage, discuss their ideas for our new Treasures Exhibition, and find out what they think would be the most exciting way of engaging with our stories and collections.

Notice of Proposed Changes to the Mary Marriott Trust

The Mary Marriott Trust, a Minor Trust of Exeter Cathedral, was set up to provide assistance with school fees at Exeter Cathedral School. The current objects of the Trust are limited to assistance with school fees for the sons of clergy at Exeter Cathedral school.

The Dean and Chapter, who are the trustees, are proposing the following changes to the objects:

1.) Assistance with the school fees of sons and daughters being educated at the Exeter Cathedral School of:

(a) clergy of the Church of England; or

(b) non-ordained Church of England licensed lay ministers.

2.) If and so far as in the opinion of the Trustees the income of the Charity cannot fully be applied in furtherance of the above, the Trustees may apply such income for the provision of bursaries for Exeter Cathedral School Choristers.
