Introduction:

an overview of chorister life

Your child joins us as a probationer. They spend their first term receiving specialist guidance and musical instruction as they adjust to chorister life. The following January, your probationer is installed as a full chorister. They receive their white surplice at a special evensong, and commit to choristership until the end of year 8.

In year 8, your chorister is invested as a senior chorister, taking on both musical leadership and a mentoring role over the younger children. At the final service of the year, called Valedictory Evensong, year 8 choristers are presented with leaving gifts. Leaving choristers keep in touch via The Old Choristers Association, which organises reunions every Easter Monday.



The basic pattern of chorister duties will quickly become routine. In general:

- Both sets of choristers rehearse each weekday morning except Wednesday, which is a day off.
- Choristers are met each morning at the West Wing door and taken to school after rehearsal.
- At the end of school, duty choristers are escorted to the cathedral by a chaperone.
- Boys sing evensong on Mondays and Thursdays.
- Girls sing evensong on Tuesdays and Fridays.
- Weekend duties usually alternate between boys and girls, with some weekends covered by voluntary choirs.
- Boys and girls sing together at Christmas, Easter and other special occasions for which details are shared well in advance.

the weekly routine

The chorister routine is a major commitment for parents as well as children. Remember that we are here to help, and that we can only help with what we know about!

who we are and what we do

The staff in the Cathedral music office are responsible for your children whilst they are on our site. We work closely with Exeter Cathedral School to ensure that your children have the best possible chorister experience. We want to ensure that they reach both their musical and academic potential, and that they receive the highest standards of pastoral support.



Timothy Noon has been Director of Music at Exeter Cathedral since 2016. He rehearses the choristers every morning and conducts the majority of cathedral services and concerts.

He was a chorister at Hereford Cathedral, before holding posts at Christ Church Cathedral, Oxford, St David's Cathedral in Wales, Cathedral of Christ the King in Liverpool, and Auckland Cathedral of the Holy Trinity, New Zealand.

Michael Stephens-Jones is Assistant Director of Music. He shares responsibility for rehearsing the choristers, and accompanies most services on the Cathedral organ.

He has previously been Organ Scholar at St Paul's Cathedral, Tewkesbury Abbey, Selwyn College, Cambridge and Guilford Cathedral.

Michael D'Avanzo is Organ Scholar. He assists the Directors of Music in playing the organ and training the choristers.

Eleanor Clark is Choir Chaperone and Music Administrator. She registers and chaperones the choristers at weekday morning rehearsals. She meets regularly with ECS and the Volunteer Chaperones to discuss safeguarding, pastoral, and logistical concerns.

Eleanor is a former Exeter chorister and has previously worked as chaperone for the choristers at Merton College, Oxford.

Zoe Cooper is Lead Evening Chaperone. Zoe collects the choristers from school on weekday evenings and accompanies them to the Cathedral for rehearsals and the services. She signs choristers out to parents at the end of the day.

Zoe is also an art teacher at ECS, offering a point of continuity between school and Cathedral life. As a former boarding houseparent, she offers a wealth of experience in both teaching and pastoral care.

Eleanor and Zoe are assisted by a experienced and dedicated team Volunteer **Chaperones:** Rachel Norris, Petrie Murchison, Mary Moore, Friend, Tamsin Bullocke Helen Claire Whiter. The Chaperones assist Zoe with weekday evensongs, share weekend duties between them.



The "Back Row" which provides the lower parts (Alto, Tenor and Bass) of the Cathedral Choir is made up of two groups. There are six Lay Vicars: experienced singers who have careers as professional musicians which they pursue alongside Cathedral duties. There are six Choral Scholars, younger singers who are usually full-time students at the University of Exeter or students undertaking a pre- or post-University gap-year.





Andrew Downton is the Cathedral's Singing Development Leader. He conducts Devon County Junior choir (DCJC) and Schola Exe and works on the Chorister Outreach Prgoramme. He also meets regularly with our choristers to provide individual and small-group vocal training.



others you may see around the Cathedral



The Reverend Dr Mike Harrison is the Bishop of Exeter. He has oversight and care for the whole Diocese of Exeter, which includes all the Church of England parishes in Devon.



Chris Palmer is Canon Treasurer. He is taking a lead on our development project and building works.



Thomas Mitchell is Custos/ Head Virger. He is responsible for the teams of Virgers, Cleaners and Seamstresses to ensure smooth daily operation.



Deborah Parsons is Canon Chancellor. She is responsible for pastoral care in the Cathedral, and for Christian nurture.



Catherine Escott is the Chief Operating Officer. She oversees the management of Cathedral staff and the Chapter's strategy.





Cate Edmonds is the Canon Steward. She works to develop the Cathedral's relationship to the wider Diocese, especially schools.



Procedures:



Rehearsals

- Rehearsals are held in the Song Schools. There are two Song Schools, uusally used for boys and girls separately. Sometimes, senior and junior choristers may also be rehearsed separetely in each room.
- There are boys and girls loos in between the two rooms, as well as a water fountain. These are for chorister use only during rehearsal times and the chaperone ensures this rule is kept to by other Cathedral staff.
- If a child needs the loo during rehearsal, they can ask the Director of Music to be excused.



Sundays - Chorister Care

- Choristers who cannot go home between Sunday Eucharist and Evensong may attend Chorister Care at ECS.
- Chorister Care involves supervised lunch and activities, led by Mr Wojiech Mazur, who teaches pre-prep at ECS.
- Parents are asked to email eleanor.clark@exetercathedral.org.uk one week in advance to enrol their child in Sunday care.

Drop-off and Pick-up

- This is the West Wing, where choristers must be dropped off for morning rehearsals between 8 and 8:10am.
- Choristers will always be met by a member of staff, so we ask you not to linger in the car park; Cathedral Staff are arriving at the same time.
- You may park in Palace Gate outside the school. Please ask ECS to add your vehicle to the Cathedral's ANPR system to avoid a fine for parking.
- If you change your vehicle, please alert both Tom Salmon at liturgy@ exeter-cathedral.org.uk and ECS at reception@exetercs.org
- Sign-out after services takes place at the West Wing, with Zoe Cooper or another Chaperone.



Services

- If a chorister feels unwell or needs the loo during a service, they can quietly leave the choir stalls and go to the chaperone, who will escort them out.
- If a child cannot sing but is well enough to watch the service, they may sit with the chaperone for the remainder.



Communication






- If your child is running late, text the chorister phone. A member of staff will ensure their safe admission to the building.
- If your child is ill and will not attend morning rehearsal, text the chorister phone and email ECS.
- If your child is taken ill during a service, the chaperone will use this number to contact you.
- If you are running late to collect your child, please text the chorister phone with an ETA.
- During offsite activities, the chorister phone number will keep parents updated about return times, sometimes via group chats on Telegram.
- If your child has a mobile phone, it will be collected before morning practice and returned either after school or after Evensong. We therefore ask you not to text your own child about arrangments.

For non-urgent or ongoing logistical and pastoral concerns, you can always get in touch with the music office staff by email.

Safeguarding

- During term time, weekly pastoral meetings take place between the Cathedral music office staff and Mrs Emma Ross, the Designated Safeguarding Lead at ECS.
- This ensures a joined-up approach to care across both organisations, whether we are responding to a concern raised by a parent, chorister or teacher, or to observations made by chaperones.
- Within the Cathedral, the Precentor has safeguarding responsibility for the Choir, and attends our weekly pastoral meetings.
- The team are advised by Mrs Sarah Reddington, who is the Cathedral's Safeguarding Adviser. She is also a former teacher at ECS.
- You can raise a concern with Sarah at: safeguarding@exeter-cathedral.org.uk.
- The Dean is ultimately responsible for safeguarding across the Cathedral as a whole.



Frequently Asked Questions:



Does the Cathedral offer activities for my non-Chorister children?

Cloister Club is our activity programme for children, taking place during term time Sunday Eucharists from 10-10:45am. To find out about our Junior Choir, DCJC, contact andrew.downton@exetercathedral.org.uk.

What opportunities do choir parents have to get involved at the Cathedral?

Choir parents have been, and are, volunteers in the Cathedral. Their roles include helping as tour guides, sidesmen, stewards and servers. Occasionally, choir parents may also serve as extra chaperones at larger services or concerts.

Does the choir ever go on tour?

Yes! Most recently we had a successful tour to France in July 2025. The Cathedral Choir aims to take years 7 & 8 on tour every other year. The Dean & Chapter has a Tour Fund to cover costs, but this relies on fundraising from the Choir Association and other sources.

What if my child is unhappy?

Whilst choristership is fun and rewarding, it can also be tiring and at times pressurising for children. We observe choristers all the time to ensure their wellbeing, but if you are ever concerned, please email Tim Noon and Eleanor Clark to arrange a chat.

Can my child learn a musical instrument?

Of course! The Dean and Chapter funds lessons in one musical instrument for each chorister, in addition to their scholarship to ECS. Additional lessons will not be funded by the Cathedral.

What if we have financial concerns?

We appreciate the commitment of both time and money that parents make to choristership. If you have concerns about funding school fees, please contact Steven Webber at ECS as soon as possible, at s.webber@exetercs.org. The sooner he knows about the situation, the sooner he can try to help.

If my child has other commitments, can they miss a service?

We know our choristers are often multi-talented children, but we do ask that choristership takes priority over other activities. Family weddings and funerals are acceptable reasons for a planned absence; sporting fixtures and family holidays are not. Please write to Mr Noon well in advance to request an absence.

What happens if my son's voice changes before the end of year 8?

Each year, one or more of our boy choristers may lose their treble voice before the end of their time in the choir. This can be a sensitive time for boys, and each child's vocal development and needs will be different. Mr Noon will work with you and your son to find the best way for him to conclude his chorister career. Often, if a boy is unable to sing in the choir, he enjoys assisting in the organ loft or library. A boy chorister's scholarship is honoured to the end of year 8 even if he is no longer able to sing in the choir.

What can I do if I am concerned about something or someone at the Cathedral?

If someone is in immediate danger, always phone 999. For safeguarding concerns, contact the Safeguarding Advisor on 01392 294969. For other concerns, such as bullying or harrassment, you may use the complaints procedure found at bt.ly/eccomplaints.

What if my child is falling behind at school?

At weekly meetings between
School and Cathedral staff, we have
opportunities to notice when childen
are struggling. If you are concerned and
would like to arrange a joint meeting,
please email Eleanor Clark, Timothy
Noon, and your child's form tutor.

How can I arrange baptism or confirmation in the Cathedral?

Confirmation is offered to children in years 7 and above. Choristers, siblings and family members can speak to James Mustard about preparing for confirmation. To arrange a baptism, please contact liturgy@exetercathedral.org.uk.

How do I learn about my child's musical progress?

Mr Noon writes reports for each chorister, but you can always get in touch at other times by email.



Cathedral Choir Association

The Cathedral Choir Association exists to work with the Dean and Chapter, and ECS, to promote the interests of choristers and to encourage the corporate life of the whole choir – which includes chorister parents! The profits of one pre-Christmas concert go to the Association fund and the profits of the winter Candlelight Concert go to its tour fund.

The CCA therefore:

- offers and organises treats and/or gifts for choristers
- organises social functions to encourage community and fellowship within the choir
- raises funds for projects nominated by the Association, the Chapter, and the Music & Liturgy department – eg. tours



The CCA regularly organises:

- Holy Saturday Chorister Sports Day, often followed by Bring and Share lunch
- Meals after special occasions such as Installations and Valedcitory
- Christmas Day lunch, held at School and subsided by both ECS and the Cathedral





The CCA's members are:

- Parents and legal caregivers of current choristers: from the date your child joins the choir until the AGM following their leaving the choir.
- Current adults in the choir.
- Cathedral Chapter, Cathedral Music office staff and the ECS Head are exofficio members.
- The Committee comprises: Honorary Secretary, a member responsible for Financial Liasion with the Chapter, and four members (one an adult choir member) leading on social events, fundraising and planning.



The CCA meets:

- Annually, with dates given at least two weeks in advance.
- The meeting is chaired by the Precentor or a deputy nominated by the Dean.
- The meeting receives reports from the Chapter and Music Office, reviews the CCA finances and carries out elections.
