





After some years working in computing, she went to Wycliffe Hall, Oxford to train for ordained ministry. Before moving to Devon, Moira served as the Archdeacon of Reigate in Southwark Diocese.

The Bishop of Crediton serves the whole of Devon, but has particular care for North Devon, Mid Devon and East Devon. She has recently published *The Missing Ending: Rediscovering the Joy of the Ascension and From Nazareth to Northumbria, how Christianity came to Britain and stayed.*
