“Is it helpful to talk about Dying?”

Alison Grove is a retired physician, initially working in General Practice, before specialising in Palliative Medicine. She has worked in different settings, hospitals, hospices and the community. Having this experience made her appreciate the value for families, individuals and communities of discussions around older care, and end of life care. Her faith has always been, she hopes, at the core of her practice, and at the heart of her own decision making.
